It all started with the Queen...

THE BEGINNING: The conception of the Pocono Riders goes way back to 1983 at the Aspencade Convention at Lake George (now known as Americade) (*editor's note – 41 years ago and some of our members still go every year!*) At this event, Ron and Alice Swink rode into Lake George and some of the tour guides convinced Alice to run for Queen which she did AND she won! While enjoying her royal spoils, they met two people that would end up being important in the making the club a reality. The next paragraph is written by Alice to describe the club's start:

Founded on April 17, 1986 April 17, 1986

n 1983 Ron and Alice went to Lake George for the first Aspencade Convention held in the East (now Americade). After Aspenade Ron and Alice went to a Roamer's Rally in July 1983. They were completely fascinated with the Roamer's, the things they did, the way they got along and the Rally in general. Alice really wished the was a club like his in the Poconos. At this 1983 Roamers Rally, Ron and Alice met 2 fellow Pennsylvania motorcyclists Mike Zuber and Phil Buzzuto. 1984- Dave Baucher, Rider magazine, accompanied by Ron and Alice went back to Aspencade. Dave's mission was to write an article on Aspencade and interview Alice. At Aspencade Ron and Alice once more saw Phil. They also met several of the staff of Rider Magazine. In July it was time for the Roamers Rally-by this time Ron and Alice were old friends with many of the Roamers. When Alice mentioned how much she enjoyed the Roamers and how she wished the Poconos had a similar club, Phil commented that whenever Alice wanted to do the start up for a club, he would be there to help. 1985-After a long winter it was off to Aspencade 85. By the time the Swinks met Phil at the Roamers Rally that year, Alice knew they had to do something-it was time to start a club. The winter of 85 passed with letters and conversations to the Rider Staff on how to begin. How many people were required for a Charter? The Charter allowed us to use the Rider Logo and to have the Charter noted in Rider Magazine. It was a long expectancy from July 1983 until April 1986. April 17, 1986 was the first Rider Motorcycle Touring Club meeting with 13 people present. The official Charter was signed on May 30, 1986 with 20 members.



Why Join?


That is the question of the day. RMTC was formed to bring the group motorcycle experience to the Poconos. There are plenty of great roads and the Swinks were avid riders willing to introduce interested people to the art of group riding.

There are a lot reasons why people join clubs, first being, obviously, the joy of riding. Seeking out friendships with like-minded people is second. Then there are those who find charity riding to add to the quality and significance of their lives. I think most of us enjoy the adventure, the sharing, and the camaraderie of riding and touring. Bikers have their own place in the world and being part of that realm is exciting and that draws in a lot of riders.

Who joins also depends on the type of motorcycle club. RMTC was set up as a chapter motorcycle club with positions and leadership to direct the club in a certain direction. There was interest in charity riding, being part of the community, plotting and executing weekend and weeklong tours, and members being connected in activities on and off the motorcycle. Participation in club meetings is also important especially in filling the positions that lead the club in its directive. It is the club's responsibility to pull in new members and in the end, it is a lot of people that are interconnected through the love of riding and being involved in the club's survival.

There was a big difference between RMTC being a motorcycle club as just a riding club. Riding clubs often have nothing in common besides riding, so they only meet up to enjoy riding together. That was not the case for RMTC. Members became friends off their bikes and friendships lasted decades. After spending the summer touring, there were holiday parties (every holiday!), birthday gatherings, picnics, trips in the car during the winter months, football get togethers, weddings, and last rides for those who passed into the next journey. It was the love of riding that brought people together and true friendship that kept them together.

I make it sound like sugar and lollipops and of course, like all groups, people come and go for a variety of reasons. Why did people join the motorcycle club ripping up the roads in the Poconos? On the next couple of pages, are peoples responses to that exact question!

When Sue Crowley asked us to write something about what RMTC or Pocono Riders meant to us, I thought sure. Easy-Peasy. Well, the club and Carl Rega (deceased) literally kept me sane. The President's Gadgets


Many of you know my propensity for motorcycles and motorcycle gadgets. I am going to try to give our members a monthly update on new items that become available. This month I am showcasing a product called the Cycle Hill Tire Changer. A few years ago I had the pleasure of watching a 100lb young lady at Americade change a 280 chopper tire in less than a minute flat using the No-Mar tire changer. This was a very impressive demonstration however the price of the unit was close to \$800. I thought that I would need to change a lot of tires to make it pay for itself. Fast forward a few years and No-Mar is marketing a new product called the Cycle Hill Tire Changer with a price of \$375. Now I am really interested. The company noticed that they were getting a lot of requests for their patented no-scratch mount/dismount bars-far more than could be attributed to sales of their own machines. The owner of the company thought that perhaps there were a lot of people who would like a high quality, though lower cost, machine to change tires two or three times per year on their own bikes. He designed the Cycle Hill Tire Changer as a lower cost alternative to their No-Mar line. It is made from the same materials and the same strength as their more expensive units. Wing World just did a test with one changing the tires of a Wing. They claim that Wing tires are one of the hardest to change due to a very stiff sidewall. They gave this unit quite the review and stated that it is a cost effective alternative that will give professional results without damaging our precious wheels in the process. They also sell a number of great accessories for it including a mount to place it on the trailer hitch of your car, truck or SUV and a static balancer. You can check it out at www.cyclehilltirechanger.com . The website also contains self-help videos on how to operate the unit. Now, my only problem it to convince Jennifer as to how much money I can save by buying this unit! Wish me LUCK! Scott T. Gilliland


The caption reads; Scott Gilliland took us on this water adventure. He thought we forgave him, but we waited till elections and made him our president. That'll teach him!












The Whoops award happened early in the club's history.



The rules of the award that you had to keep it (and the shame) until the next "winner" was chosen!


The clothespin stayed with us until Bill Freese took over and switched out the clothes pin for a rubber chicken!











The ride to the Chatterbox was a good one ... always great turn out. We were sadden when the building was sold and torn down.


4th of July Picnics

Always a wonderful day of camaraderie and food, food, and did I say, food???










Community involvement ... Ride for the Boobie Charity Ride










The many facets of RMTC Membership Drives





Old Business:

New Business:

- Rob Heh announced the vacancies for the PR including the presidency. Other positions up for nominations included VP, secretary, treasurer, back up treasurer, directors, newsletter, sunshine officer, product manager, party coordinator, road captains.
- Meeting places were discussed. Finding a restaurant where meetings and meals could happen simultaneously has become an issue.
